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The death of Mrs. Pollock, of Roxburgh Street, relict of the late Mr. J. H. Pollock, formerly the well-known handicapper, took place at her residence, Roxburgh Street, on Wednesday morning.

The deceased lady, who has been a confirmed invalid, leaves two sons and one daughter, all married.

The interment, took place yesterday.

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The death occurred in Wellington on Wednesday of Mrs. Mima Tisdale Pollock, a much-respected resident of this city for nearly forty years.

Mrs. Pollock was a daughter of the late Mr. Henri Potto, a member of a distinguished French family, and came cut to New Zealand from England (her native country) with her parents when she was a child. Mr. and Mrs. Potto landed in Wellington, and soon after went to Wanganui, where they lived for some years and where their daughter was married to Mr. Pollock. Mr. and Mrs. Pollock made their home in Wellington, and both died here, Mr. Pollock predeceasing his wife by about 18 months. For the last ten years of her life Mrs. Pollock had been an invalid. Prior to then she took an active part in philanthropic movements.

She has left two sons (Mr. W. H. Pollock, secretary of Nelson, Moate, and Co., and Mr. H. P. Pollock, of Yeoman and Garrett, Wellington), a daughter (Mrs. F. P. Morrison, of Newcastle, New South Wales), and two grandchildren.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon, the Rev. A. T. B. Page, of St. Mark's Church, officiated at the graveside at Karori. The chief mourners were the deceased's two sons.
